School Attendance

ONLINE LEARNING SUCCESS

Remote learning became an essential provision during the past year and Cyfarthfa High School excelled despite the many challenges it faced.

Due to the Covid-19 lockdowns our staff and students adapted to a whole new way of learning.

Thanks to various online-learning



software we maintained a first-class education provision for students even while working from home.

The students quickly showed a positive attitude to virtual classes by regularly attending live lessons and submitting online work of a very high standard. Whether it was providing an online St David's Day Eisteddfod or celebrating Christmas, marking World Holocaust Day or British Science Week, students remained engaged and enthusiastic to learn.

Every department used the lockdown period to fully utilise the online provision available to them, whether it was for a scientific experiment, produce artwork, explore religion or cooking some mouth-watering dishes from Indian to Italian cuisine – and plenty of cakes!

This level of interaction also supported their mental health and helped alleviate feelings of isolation away from the school environment, their teachers and friends.

Staff provided a daily registration for students through Microsoft Teams and



there was also a provision for regular pastoral calls when required. Staff also maintained a close relationship with parents by using Teams for online meetings. Some of the popular online learning included:

Creating instructional videos on Youtube, the engaging features of Pupil Voice, Class Charts, Microsoft FORMS, Microsoft STREAM, and

BBC Bitesize

Students particularly enjoyed using Kahoot! a game-based learning platform that made it easy to create, share and play learning games or trivia quizzes.

There was also a demand for Mentimeter, which built interactive presentations and created online polls and questions which in turned generated debate in the online-classroom through a chat feature.

Despite this unprecedented period Cyfarthfa High school provided a daily interactive classroom experience which benefited every year group while isolated at home. Staff and students adapted quickly to the changes circumstances and the ability to work virtually has been hugely beneficial.




Where am I now?




